<u>Academic Skills</u>

- Phonemic Awareness
 - This is the ability to identify and manipulate individual sounds in spoken words and having the ability to segment and blend.
- Phonological Awareness
 - This is the ability to identify rhymes, syllables, onsets and rimes.
- Letter Names
 - This is being able to identify both capital and lower case letters and name them.
- Print Awareness
 - Understanding that written language is related to oral language.
 Have an understanding that English words are read from left to right.
 Have the ability to track print across multiple lines. And have one to one word tracking correspondence.
- Letter Sounds
 - This is having the ability to provide the sounds made by each letter in the alphabet.
- Writing first names with appropriate capitalization
 - Having the ability to write their first name starting with a capital and writing subsequent letters in lowercase.
- One-to-one correspondence
 - This is the act of counting each object in a set once, and only once with one touch per object.
- Counting and Cardinality
 - Having the ability to count to 20 and identify and count sets of objects up to 10.
- Subitizing
 - Having the ability to recognize the number of objects in a small group without the need to count them.
